OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

WLET is a Scottish charitable organisation monitored by the Office of the Scottish Charities' Regulator and a Company Limited by Guarantee. The aims and objectives of WLET are:

to advance community development, including rural regeneration within the Community.

- to advance education for all ages in the Community, and the public at large, with the object of improving the conditions of life of the Community.
- to provide, or assist in providing, facilities and/or activities for those in need in the Community by reason of age, isolation, ill-health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage.
 - to provide, or assist in providing, facilities and/or activities, for recreation and for the advancement of
- the arts, culture, history and heritage to be available to members of the Community and the public at large, with the object of improving the conditions of life of the Community.
- to advance conservation and preservation of the natural environment, and of buildings and sites of architectural, historic, cultural or other importance to the Community.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Much of the work undertaken by the Trustees during the financial year 2019-2020 centred around progressing the community wish that the Old School is provided with a kitchen to allow us to provide hot food and to expand the uses to which The Old School can be put. Just towards the end of the financial year when lock-down had been imposed, we heard that WLET had been successful in being awarded Regeneration Capital Grant Funding (RCGF) which would allow us to progress the building project to provide a kitchen, new toilets to meet current requirements, entrance porch with disability access.

WLET also received a grant from SSEN Resilient Communities Fund to purchase IT equipment, thanks to the application made by the Project Development Manager. This funding will enable us to run sessions to help local people access IT and the Internet with appropriate help. An employee of the Bank of Scotland volunteered to help run the sessions.

Adrian Hollister of the Perfume Studio and Kimberly McEley continued to photograph local residents for the 'Portrait of a Community' publication.

The Board was pleased to welcome one of our members as a Volunteer Fundraiser on WLET's behalf and WLET has benefited greatly from her experience and expertise. We were also very pleased to have 2 other members volunteer to help – one to read applications from a more 'distant' perspective and another who produced a wonderful synopsis of visitor comments which can now accompany applications for funding.

The Old School continued to host the meetings of Wester Loch Ewe Community Council, Good for Ewe, the local Grazing's Committee and the Bible Study Group and provided a venue for GBB Estates Rent Collection as well as becoming a regular consultation venue for a local physiotherapist.

The well-attended weekly 'drop in' session continued for a fifth year of running on a Tuesday afternoon in the summer season, moving to a Wednesday afternoon in the winter season.

Activities undertaken:

These included:

- Updated Volunteer Training
- Recruitment of an Administrative Assistant
- Running The Old Schoolhouse Tearoom and the annual exhibitions in the Old School for the 7th year with new materials in the Wester Loch Ewe room
- Furnishing and equipping the office to make it operational
- Marketing The Old School Exhibitions and The Old Schoolhouse Tearoom at the BLEAT open day in the Gairloch Hotel
- Successful table-top sale
- Various maintenance jobs completed by volunteers, eg pruning in the garden and painting the front door

- Provision of lunch after Remembrance Day Service at the Sasan
- Work culminating in the granting of Planning Permission for the kitchen, entrance porch, new toilet facilities, and upgraded insulation, etc
- New car-parking area established but not yet completed
- Very successful Christmas afternoon tea with Santa's Elf over 60 people in attendance
- Hogmanay Gathering in the Old School on the last evening of 2019
- 90thbirthday party held in January 2020 for a well-loved local personality
- Successful afternoon tea on 21st February 2020
- Soup lunch planned for 18th March 2020 was cancelled due to Government advice because of the Covid pandemic
- First Aid Course Planned for March 2020 also cancelled due to Government advice/regulations
- Regeneration Capital Grant Funding awarded in March 2020 just prior to lock-down
- Working with Highland Council to provide suitable work experience for pupils from Gairloch High School
- Providing a venue during social time at the WLET AGM for GALE to run a 'Planning for Real' trial
- Obtaining planning permission for Phase 2 work replacing the windows in the parts of the building not done under Phase 1.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

WLET's Income has significantly exceeded its expenditure during this financial year due to fiscal prudence during the previous period and due to the following:

- Revenue from Donations in the Old Schoolhouse Tearoom showed a significant increase from the previous season and the revenue from donors of gift aiding also rose.
- During the financial year, WLET received various gifts from private funding organisations, some of which was given for designated purposes, eg the construction of a shed. Also, during the financial year donations were received from local individuals and members.
- Release of revenue funding from The National Lottery Community Fund in tranches as agreed for various uses including payment of salaries.
- Release of half of the capital funding promised from The Prince's Countryside Fund in January 2020.

The Trustees' policy is to retain sufficient funds to cover unexpected expenditure and to meet on-going commitments. Due to the pandemic this is proving more and more difficult. The Treasurer monitors these funds closely and the Trustees review the financial position at each Board Meeting. A realistic budget has been set and is closely monitored. Restricted Funds are earmarked for their specific purposes as are those given for a designated purpose.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The Trustees are continuing to work towards community goals. We hold meetings by electronic means, monthly or fortnightly as necessary.

Your Trustees will continue working towards the realisation of the Phase 1 goal identified by the Community – an upgraded tearoom with new entrance porch, new kitchen and new, up-to-date toilet facilities as required for planning permission.

At the time of writing, the global pandemic has caused the Scottish Government to bring in strict measures which curtail normal daily life and due to this we are unsure what progress will be possible in the immediate future.

The Board is in discussion with Highland Council which administers RCGF projects on behalf of the Scottish Government. It is hoped that we may be able to be in a position to award the building contract by the end of the financial year. However, many organisations, eg Benjamin Tindall Architects, are not working 'normally' and hold-ups are likely to be inevitable due to this.

Trustees will continue to work to ensure the Phase 1 work goes ahead as planned and will also seek funding to upgrade the insulation and heating system in that part of the building that is not upgraded on the completion of Phase 1.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The company, which is a recognised charity in Scotland, is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association on 17th March 2015. The activities of the company are governed by the Articles of Association of Wester Loch Ewe Trust which were modified on 24th June 2016.

The management of the company is the responsibility of the Trustees who are the elected Directors and Co-opted Directors appointed under the terms of the Articles of Association amended in June 2016. There must be no fewer than five and no more than twelve Directors with the majority being elected directors. There are currently nine elected Directors who form the Board and who meet every 4-6 weeks to direct and manage the affairs, property and financial position of WLET.

The original Subscribers to the Articles of Association became the Interim Directors of WLET when it was established in March 2015. These Directors retired at the first Annual General Meeting and were elected "en bloc".

Elected Directors are nominated from the Ordinary Members. Each Elected Director is elected by a vote of the Ordinary Member., At the second and subsequent AGMs one-third of the Elected Directors (or the nearest number upwards) shall retire from office. Up to three individuals may be co-opted by the Board of Directors from time to time. These Co-opted Directors serve until the next AGM, at which time they can be re-co-opted, or can be removed from office by a vote of the Board.

Members of the Company include:

- Subscribers (being those Ordinary Members who signed the original Memorandum of Association).
 Ordinary Members who are individuals aged 16 years and over who (a) are ordinarily resident in the Community; and (b) are entitled to vote at a local government election in a polling district that
- includes the Community or part of it; and (c) who support the Purposes. Ordinary Members are
 entitled to stand for election to the Board and to vote at a General Meeting or stand proxy for another
 Member.
 - Associate Members: those individuals who are not ordinarily resident in the Community and those
- organisations wherever located that support the Purposes. Associate Members are neither eligible to stand for election to the Board not to vote at any General Meeting.
 - Junior Members: those individuals who are aged between 12 and 15 years who support the Purposes.
- Junior Members are neither eligible to stand for election to the Board not to vote at any General Meeting.

The Board of Director-Trustees directs and manages the affairs, property and financial position of the Company. Each Trustee has one vote in Trustees' Meetings, held approximately every 4-6 weeks. In the event of an equal number of votes for and against any resolution at a Board Meeting, the chair of the meeting shall have a casting vote as well as a deliberative vote.

The organisation has two part-time employees.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The Trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The above report has been prepared in accordance with the provisions applicable to companies subject to the small companies regime as set out in Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006 and in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102).

Basis of preparation

There has been no change to the accounting policies (valuation rules and method of accounting) since last year and no changes have been made to accounts for previous years.

Grants payable

All grant expenditure is accounted for on an actual paid basis plus an accrual for grants that have been approved by the trustees at the end of the year but not yet

paid.

Governance costs

These include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the Charity, including any audit/independent examination fees, costs linked to the strategic management of the Charity, together with a share of

other administration costs.

Other expenditure

These are support costs not allocated to a particular activity.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life:

Fixtures and fittings

20% Reducing Balance

Office equipment

20% Reducing Balance

Land and buildings are recorded at purchase costs (Old School building £Nil; Car park and grounds £2,500) and are not depreciated. The Old School building is valued at approx. £200,000.

Stocks

Stock is included at the lower of cost or net realisable value. Donated items of stock are recognised at fair value which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay for the items on the open market.

Trade and other debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and on hand, demand deposits with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less and bank overdrafts. In the statement of financial position, bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings or current liabilities. In the Statement of Cash Flows, cash and cash equivalents are shown net of bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the company's cash management.

Trade and other creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for nay trade discounts due.

Pension costs

The charity operates a defined contribution plan for its employees. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the company pays fixed contributions into a separate entity. Once the contributions have been paid the company has no further payments obligations. The contributions are recognised as expenses when they fall due. Amounts not paid are shown in accruals in the balance sheet. The assets of the plan are held separately from the company in independently administered funds.

2 Company status

The company is a private company limited by guarantee and consequently does not have share capital. The members of the company guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up.
